Concerns about Short-term Rentals ...

Having received numerous complaints from residents about excessive noises, overflown parking and garbage on streets, and mischief behaviours from strangers living at short-term rental accommodation such as Airbnb in the neighbourhoods, I have begun research on the subject of Airbnb and short-term rentals, particularly looking at the measures undertaken by municipalities around the world with a focus in Canada on addressing the proliferation of Airbnb and short-term rentals.

In February, I tabled a Member Motion on **regulation of Airbnb** and short-term rentals. I am pleased that my Motion has been passed unanimously to direct staff to look into the feasibility of adopting a By-law to regulate and license the Airbnb and short-term rental accommodation later in the year. Thanks to residents who voiced their support of my Motion.

Snow Windrow Removal for ALL!

Currently, Richmond Hill provides FREE snow windrow service for seniors and people with physical disabilities. In 2015, I had requested the issue of extending such service to all households be reviewed.

On March 25, 2019, Council considered the alternatives and adopted the recommended option to **provide Town-wide windrow clearing program** in house with enhanced service delivery with the conversion of causal/seasonal staff. According to staff, direct costs for the snow windrow clearing program is \$1.09 million for an approximate cost of \$20 per driveway.

Having advocated for implementing the snow windrow removal service for all within a reasonable cost for a number of years, I am very pleased to share that Richmond Hill will remove snow windrow at the end of driveways of all households in the **next winter season 2019-2020**.

What's new ... 1053-16th Avenue

Since the Community Information Meeting and Council Public Meeting held on this proposed development on the subject site for 60 semi-detached and 7 townhouses in 2018, the developer has submitted a revised proposal for development.

The main revisions are as follows:

- Proposed townhouses have been replaced with semis, such that the proposed development has **no townhouses**;
- Total number of dwelling units has been reduced to 56;
- Lots have been widened from a minimum of 14.91 metres (48.9 feet) to a minimum of 16.46 metres (54 feet);
- Side yard setbacks have been increased from a minimum of 0.6 metres (1.97 feet) to 0.9 metres (2.95 feet); and,
- Facades have been modified (e.g. materials, colours, design).

At this time, Town staff and other public bodies are reviewing the revised application. Please visit my website, www.godwinchan.com, from time to time for latest developments.



While there has been a significant amount of progress since construction began in the Fall 2017, the project has also encountered 🏾 a number of challenges that include the financial difficulties faced by the contractor, delays in the delivery of construction supplies, other construction-related issues, and weather delays. As a result, we will be completing the project in phases:




- Phase 1 (proposed to be completed mid-spring 2019) new program rooms in original building
- Phase 2 (to be completed through 2019) soccer field (proposed to be completed in early spring and permitted for the full 2019 season), south playground and multi-sports court (proposed to be completed summer 2019)
- Phase 3 splash pad and north playground (proposed to be completed summer 2019), arena expansion building with fitness studio (proposed to be completed late-fall 2019)
- Phase 4 (proposed to be completed late-fall 2019) baseball diamonds
- ***Please note that Blackmore Tennis Club and the adjacent parking lot reopened to the public in October 2018.

New Grass & Weeds By-law

Last year, the Town dealt with 793 cases associated with long grass and weeds—the highest number of cases for Bylaw enforcement than any other by-law. After review, Council adopted a new Grass and Weeds By-law that include:

- Clarified "Grass and Weeds" and "Garden"
- Year-round Application prohibiting grass & weeds higher than 20 centimeters
- Boulevard Maintenance Requirement consistent with other municipalities



Improvements on the way ...

Addressing Speeding concerns

In response to concerns about speeding on the streets, I have requested that the well-received Polemounted Radar Speed Boards be deployed to **Briggs Avenue** and **Lagani Avenue**, in addition to the Boards currently on **Red Maple Road** where traffic volume is heavy. A few years ago, the Town's first pair of the Pole-mounted Radar Speed Boards was installed on High Tech Road with positive outcomes in speed reduction and compliance with speed limit among motorists. It is expected that the two pairs will be installed on Briggs Avenue between Queen College Drive and Valleymede Drive, and on Lagani Avenue between **Kevi Crescent** and **Rubin Street** later this year.



Parks on their way...

In February, Council approved the 2019 Capital Budget that will focus on managing and renewing Town assets and infrastructure to support a vibrant, sustainable municipality. In Ward 6, the following projects were approved:

<u>King's College Park</u> - Rejuvenation of the 30-year old King's College Park will commence this year. Notice of construction will be distributed to the nearby residents before commencement of work.

Rockwell Parkette - The amount of land initially dedicated by the developer for the use of a park was undersized. In the past year, the Town acquired three properties on Rockwell Road to expand the area for the park that can be developed for use by residents in the vicinity of Rockwell Road, including those at the nearby condominium buildings and townhouses. During 2019, conceptual design work for the 1.08 acre parkette will be undertaken.

Briggs Parkette— The design for the parkette is complete and the project has been issued for tender. It is expected that construction will commence in May 2019. Special thanks to residents for their comments on the conceptual design at the open house and thereafter.
